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QUICK NEWS



BASMA'S HEALTH:

One of the leaders of our women's outreach in the Gulf, Basma, continues to battle stomach cancer. She has been undergoing intensive chemotherapy and was recently admitted into ICU for few days. Although she is no longer in ICU, she remains in hospital and would love your prayers for healing.

KINGDOM PLATFORM:

A new animation series for children has been launched on our YouTube channel, Kingdom Platform, and reached 246,000 views in its first two months. In addition to being wholesome content for children, it aims to help the parents watching it learn how to deal with issues, such as children misbehaving, in a godly way.



STRENGTHS:

Work has begun on a new social media project, Strengths, which counters misconceptions about Christianity in the Arab World. Pray for wisdom for the team as they run focus groups and begin the difficult task of creating bold and impactful content that will gain traction online.

SUDANESE REFUGEES:

We recently empowered and trained 20 workers from four different NGOs in North Africa who are working with women refugees from Sudan. The programme supported these workers in their own needs, but also enabled them to use our programme. Two of these NGOs have already applied our materials in their work with 36 refugee children.





Impacting the Whole Family

HELPING CHILDREN ON THEIR HEALING JOURNEY

The number of children in Middle East who have experienced trauma is growing. This is due to increased poverty and prolonged conflict. In one North African country alone, it is estimated that there are between 1.7 and 4 million orphans. A large number of these, in addition to the trauma of losing their parents, have faced sexual and psychological abuse.

Providing help for traumatised children whilst they are still young is vital in order to reduce the negative effects of trauma in their adult lives.

Middle Eastern countries, however, tend to lack mental health funding, resources, and workforce. Stigma around mental health, inadequate transport, and complex referral processes are also barriers to service provision.

MEM is tackling these issues. We use a 3D animation series, coupled with interactive workshops, to facilitate the healing of children in refugee camps, orphanages and communities in need. The animated series follows the journey of 8-year-old Farah as she faces a series of difficult life events, such as the death of her mother and moving home. After each experience, Farah gains strength and hope from learning about Bible heroes who faced similar situations. The children identify closely with Farah and, after watching each episode, take part in workshops, including art therapy.

So far, MEM has trained over 260 community providers to use Life in the Desert. These trainees have now reached over 7,000 children in refugee camps, orphanages and poor communities with the programme.

Trainees often comment that our programme is the best material they've ever used for traumatised children and report that children who have historically struggled to receive help literally run to this programme.

The programme's Christian content, which speaks to children from all faiths or none, is integral to its success. As children learn about the God of the Bible, they start to understand themselves as children under His care. They begin to experience a safe connection with a God who heals.

The caregivers we train to run the programme, many of whom have experienced horrific trauma themselves, benefit professionally and personally:

BECAUSE I WORK WITH CHILDREN WHO FACE
CHALLENGING LIFE SITUATIONS, I SOMETIMES FEEL LIKE I'M BREAKING DOWN. I LOCK MYSELF IN MY ROOM AND CRY SO THAT NO ONE WILL NOTICE. THROUGH THE TRAINING, I LEARNT HOW IMPORTANT IT IS TO EXPRESS OUR BURDENS AND THE THINGS WE FIND CHALLENGING, SO THAT WE CAN RECHARGE AND GO ON.

Interview With

Q&A WITH THE CEO OF THE MEM'S PRODUCTION COMPANY

CAN YOU TALK US THROUGH THE CREATIVE PROCESS OF CREATING THE LIFE IN THE DESERT ANIMATION?

I am constantly amazed at the amount of work everyone invests in getting Life in the Desert completed to perfection. After the script is written by Salam*, it is revised by three different people from three different angles: Ibtisam revises it with a director's eye, Rawda looks at the psychological impact on children, and Hoda reviews the spiritual teaching throughout the series from a theological standpoint. These three revisions usually lead to rewriting major parts of the script. Yet Salam, the scriptwriter, is so patient and does whatever it takes to incorporate feedback so the work can be the highest quality.

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER THE SCRIPT HAS BEEN FINALISED?

That's when we start the process of modelling, rendering, lighting, animation, dynamics, compositing, editing, and voice design. It takes a long time as we have to rework elements a number of times to make sure quality of the 3D animation is excellent.

THERE ARE 26 EPISODES (2 SEASONS) OF LIFE IN THE DESERT, HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE TO MAKE EACH EPISODE?

In normal working conditions, it takes two and a half to three months to complete an episode. As the number of animators on staff tends to fluctuate, our animators have been expanding their areas of speciality and

learning each other's roles so that they can help out if colleagues are absent.

AND HOW MANY ACTORS DO YOU USE?

Ah yes, in Season 2 we actually used 12 different professional voice actors. And when we dub the season into different Arabic dialects so that it's more widely accessible, we would use another 12 actors.

DO YOU HAVE ANY TESTIMONIES FROM YOUR TEAM MEMBERS ABOUT WORKING ON THE LIFE IN THE DESERT SERIES?

My colleague, Kareem, shared that he was personally touched by the heroine's encounter with Jesus. It was eye opening for him to realise that his relationship with God is easily affected by his relationship with others. He's noticed that when he has a quarrel or is struggling with unforgiveness, he finds it difficult to enjoy his relationship with God to the full. As a result, he's learnt to put more effort into building good relationships with others and letting go of the grudges he holds in his heart.

Another team member, Noor, shared that she has always been impressed by the wonderful relationship between the heroine and her father. He is always good to her, even when she is angry or sad. The father is such an attractive model of God's unconditional love.

DO YOU HAVE ANY PRAYER REQUESTS YOU WANT TO SHARE?

Team members have experienced a number of health issues and tricky life circumstances over the past few years, so we would love prayer for health and spiritual protection.

New Media Teams

WHAT MAKES US DISTINCTIVE?

Recent months have seen natural disasters and increased instability in places where we have been training emerging media teams. Our teams, our partners, and their communities need our continued support.

Libya is still reeling from the flood which tore through the city of Derna, leaving over 10,000 dead and 46,000 people displaced. Even before this disaster, political stalemate and dire living conditions meant that Libya was a volatile and sensitive place to work in. Despite this, MEM has been training and supporting a new media team for Libya to translate and record the Bible in the Libyan dialect, in which no Bible translation exists. The team have almost finished translating and creating audio recordings of the four Gospels. Their future goal is to start a digital ministry with a specialised page for Libyan youth.

Please pray for this new media team as they continue to navigate a sensitive security situation and work hard to reach Libyans with the Gospel.



Our team are travelling to Northern Iraq, also known as Iraqi Kurdistan, this November to train 16 Kurdish, Yazidi and Iranian young believers on how to use digital media to reach their communities for Christ. This is particularly exciting as 98% of people in Iraq are unreached with the Gospel. However, after a recent suicide bombing outside the Turkish parliament, Turkey launched airstrikes against Kurdish militants in Northern Iraq as we write this.

Please pray for visas that our teams are waiting, for a safe travel for MEM's team and that the training will be fruitful, so that more Iranians, Kurds, and Yazidis can hear about Jesus.



The war in Sudan has forced hundreds of thousands of Sudanese to flee to where our team are in North Africa. Although the war is upsetting, it is a blessing to meet media teams from Sudan in person. They have a unique hunger and thirst for the Good News of Jesus, especially in the midst of war. We are now working with two teams, equipping them with media and social media skills so that they can share Jesus with those who follow the dominant religion of Sudan.

Praise God for new connections with Sudanese media teams despite the war. Pray that God will sustain them as they learn to reach other Sudanese people with the message of Christ.

In Morocco, the need for Jesus in the wake of the earthquake is great. We have been working with an emerging media team in Morocco and last year we provided training to 13 local believers in media basics. They have requested our help with producing the programmes that share the Gospel and resonate with Moroccans.

Please pray for this emerging Moroccan team, wisdom to know how to move forward in this season, and for increased funds to help us do so.
